Flea Problems

Cats are more likely to have fleas than dogs. Pet owners themselves are also not safe from these tiny beasts. The problem is the fact that the lifecycle of a flea is guite complex.

> dult fleas live off the blood of the animal that they have infested. A female can lay as many as 50 small, white, round eggs per day and 500-600 eggs per month. The eggs are not sticky and fall off the animal onto carpets and bedding. The eggs may take between two days and several weeks to hatch, this depends on environmental factors such as temperature and humidity. The larval stage may last from five to 18 days, this again is dependent on factors such as availability of food and environmental conditions.

Is shampooing enough?

Unfortunately not.

You see, the effects of the shampoo only last a day or so and that might not be enough. You would have to take other steps to make sure that your dog doesn't become re-infested.

Such as?

I recommend going outside and giving the dog a good combing. Then you should apply this spot-on product. It's very effective and lasts up to a month.
